### **Patient Opportunity by Deacon Eric Abe**

I have always envisioned myself as a "good boy". Growing up in a non-religious household, I tried my best to be a compliant son who obeyed his parents and listened to authority figures like teachers and Boy Scout leaders. Our home did not have a Bible, but I had an inkling of the Ten Commandments that I gathered by watching the movie by that name starring Charlton Heston. I thought that was what it meant to be a Christian . . . be a "good boy" and obey the Ten Commandments.

In my college junior year, one of my apartment mates was Glenn Kamiya. He was a friend from "small kid time" where we were on the same baseball team and participated in Boy Scouts all the way through the rank of Eagle Scout. Glenn was, and is, a true servant of Jesus Christ. He shared what it meant to be a follower of the Son of God and it was at a college ministry camp that I accepted Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior.
