Then I experience His Joy when I focus back on Him rather than on whatever Problem is facing me at that time. Wow! From Disturbance to Delight because of JESUS!

Message from Laura Newell

This week I received news from our friend, Dr. Sheena Lee, a dental surgeon who has been ministering in one of the outermost parts of the world. Some of our women will remember Sheena as our keynote speaker at a PBC women's seminar a few years ago. I want to share this with you in hopes you will join me in prayer for Sheena.

"I sat down on a resting place on the hilltop above my house where the staff and students frequently pass on their way home from campus. A 13 year- old boy came from behind and wrapped a mud-laden cloth bag around my head and covered my face, then tied the handle of the bag around my neck, attempting to suffocate me. I yelled in pidgin but before I could finish my sentence, I couldn't breathe, but I fought to loosen the rope. After some struggle, he ran away.

I was shaken up, but after a few minutes I felt complete peace, knowing God was right there with me. I realized it could have been much worse. Security identified the boy (I'll call him "K") very quickly as one of the guards saw him run down the hill and remove his mask; he had used a market bag to try and disguise his face.

Last night we had a community meeting about the incident. Now the investigation is on its way to tribal leaders and leaders of my missionary group. Early this morning a lot of local people from the campus came to say "sorry" and bring me food from their gardens.

After much prayer I communicated my thoughts to the community and its leaders. Please pray with me for the ongoing dialogue. In this culture it's common to take revenge by beating the offender or threatening to kill him. However, I am not pressing charges or asking for compensation. Instead, I ask them, "Do not lay a hand on K or his family."

Instead, I do want him to be held accountable by providing opportunities for him to understand the harm done by his behavior. I'm asking for him to make amends to me, his family, and community through disciplinary action or community service or other ways deemed appropriate. In my mind, the focus is on repair rather than putting K behind bars, to help him and other at-risk teens get off their paths of destruction. I pray that a friend of mine can share his testimony during one of the youth events on campus.

I am asking for an opportunity to directly speak with K at some point about how his crime has violated people and relationships, but he also needs to hear he is forgiven. Lord willing, I plan to return to this region in October, so part of K's community service would be to come with our team to attend an outreach at a temporary holding jail, so he can see and smell the horrific conditions inmates are placed in and realize why he should not end up there."

"Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." Romans 12:21

Will you pray with us for Sheena, for K and his family, and for the community that God's plan will be accomplished, for His glory and the good of God's people in this faraway place? There is an ongoing investigation, so please do not pass this on.

Emi Abe's Testimony

I began attending Pukalani Baptist Church in 2000 when I was a baby. I consider myself blessed because for as long as I can remember, I was able to attend church every Sunday with my family. I have vague memories of my mom carrying me while singing during the worship service, where I would shyly wave at Mr. and Mrs. Murray who sat behind us. Some of you may even remember me walking up the middle aisle to wave at my dad as he was playing the bass. In addition, PBC was my preschool where Pastor Paul gave me my first diploma! I guess you could say, PBC was my second home. I grew up learning about the Bible and the many stories that fill it; I could answer all the Sunday School, Children's Camp, and VBS questions that were thrown at me. I loved learning, but I also loved being right. Even at that young age, I knew I valued knowledge and where it could take me, and that's exactly what it was, just knowledge.

It wasn't until the 7th grade when I went to youth camp that it finally "clicked." The sermon was on Ephesians 2:8, but I decided to read the whole passage. It emphasizes that God is kind, gracious, merciful and loves you! It was great that I knew the Bible, but at the time the knowledge I gained didn't seem to affect me and I started to question if I actually understood what I was learning. If you had asked me before "What is the difference between grace and mercy?" I would have responded "Is there a big difference?" To put it simply, I learned that grace is getting something that you do not deserve, and mercy is not getting something you deserve. When it finally sunk in, I was a mess. I couldn't comprehend that the God that I had been trivializing my whole life (I understand that I was only 12), loved me with a greater love than anyone else had or ever will. It blew my mind that someone who I could not see, would care enough about me to pursue me no matter how sinful I was or how far away I ran. As a child, I didn't always have a reliable friend and it was hard for me to believe that someone would sacrifice their only son for me when I had nothing to offer them in return.

From then on, my focus changed from knowing about God, to getting to know God. This is when my relationship with God really began, and I could see him working in my life. Even when I didn't understand why things happened or why things were taken away, I knew that He had something better in store. During high school, I lost a lot of friends and as a teenager, it hurt, but God was still faithful. I held so tightly to His word which reminded me that I am loved and wanted (Isaiah 43:1)

and that He is my strength (2 Corinthians 12:9-10). It was also through those losses that I met Alenette Ballesteros and Whitney Blando, some of my best friends. And again, I was blessed through PBC because I had many Godly mentors like Jaclyn Fukagawa, Nicole Marburger, and Joanna Kaneshiro. They have poured into me and helped me grow in Christ through middle school, high school, and college.

However, when I moved out of the house, my faith was tested. I was no longer living under my parent's roof and it became more apparent that it would be solely my choice if I continued to walk with Christ. This was the first time that I felt really challenged by the world; I met so many new people, all of whom had different ideas about everything. I also struggled with my classes. Being in a new environment and learning at a college level pushed me more than I thought it would. In high school I was the top of my class, but now my grades were average, which was very difficult and discouraging for me. I was lost. Thankfully, I made good friends in the dorms, my classes, intramurals, and even reconnected with old friends who encouraged me to continue in my relationship with Christ. I once again was reminded of God's faithfulness and I realized how intimate my relationship with Him could be. It was in those lowest moments that God became the most apparent to me and now, no matter what stage of life I am in, I can see God's hand at work in everything.
